

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1 OVERVIEW OF DEPARTMENTAL PERFORMANCE FOR THE QUARTER

Service Delivery environment

The service delivery environment for the first quarter of 2017/18 financial year is characterized by a constrained and depressed economic outlook. Most significant development being the technical recession that occurred when the national economy went contracted by 0,7 percent in the first quarter of 2017. The prevailing economic conditions, unemployment and poverty levels; as well sharp increases in food prices threatens food security of many households. These are the key factors affecting the service delivery environment that the department has to respond to in the medium and long term.

Job creation is a key priority of government. Although the unemployment situation continues to deteriorate largely due to the constraint economic outlook, the interventions in the agriculture sector bore some fruits. In particular, the first quarter 2017 Labour Force Survey shows that at least 144 000 jobs were created and the agricultural sector was one of the main contributors to these new jobs. The sector plays an important role in creating jobs as it provides 16 percent of total employment in the Province as compared to 5, 5 percent nationally. Agriculture's contribution to employment is about double its contribution to the Gross Domestic Product (GDP). The department remains committed to implementing programmes and projects that will create jobs and contribute to the growth of the economy.

The service delivery environment continued to be affected by the outbreak of disease. In particular, there has been two (2) outbreaks of African Swine Fever in ... This has meant that the resources in the veterinary services must be channelled towards containing this outbreak. In addition, due to the Avian Influenza outbreak in the country, veterinary officials have been put on high alert. Should the need arise, officials will be expected to assist affected provinces with managing the outbreak.

The ISO accreditation status of the laboratory has instilled confidence in its clientele and new customers thus attracting unexpected large volumes of samples delivered to the facility resulting in overshooting of the targets. This has been exacerbated by some of the provincial laboratories that have their DAFF approval lapsed and still to be accredited by SANAS. The laboratory received a boost through CASP funding to enable a conducive service to its customers and stakeholders.

Organizational environment

In partnership with Government Employee Medical Scheme and Proactive Health, the department generated employee health profile. The profile concluded found that 370 of the 608 total employees of the department utilised sick leave days tallying 3006 collectively. The sick leave utilisation costed the department R3 719713, 00. In order to deal with this high usage of sick leave and ensure optimal productivity, the department will engage in awareness campaigns on healthy lifestyles and prevention/coping strategies to deal with chronic ailments.

The first quarter of the financial year also marks the beginning of the planning process for the next financial year. In preparation for the strategic planning that will culminate in the submission of the 1st Draft Annual Performance Plan 2018/19, at least 6 planning workshops were held with various programmes. The workshops focused reviewed the current APP and considered the new or emerging priorities with the intention to ensure that they are captured in the 1st Draft APP 2018/19. The Service Delivery Forum to be held in the second quarter will conclude this work.

Narrative progress

Human Resource Management

The department encourages the wellbeing of employees through conducting sessions that uplift morale and general wellness. One of the pillars dealing with wellness relates to health and productivity among employees. For this pillar a brief was written informing employees about chronic fatigue syndrome, its symptoms and coping mechanisms which can be a reference to manage this sickness. In addition, a financial wellness session was held where national credit regulator personnel came to educate employees on the rights of consumers, importance of savings and how the credit bureaux operates and also how they can take advantage of it.

In relation to recruitment of personnel, by 31 April 2017, the department had 31 employees who were due for permanent appointment after a 12 months' probation period. At least 18 employees have been confirmed and the outstanding employees will be processed in the second quarter. The pay progression relating to employees who fall under occupation specific dispensation has been implemented.

There has been improvement in compliance with the submission and capturing of leave application forms. During the first quarter 1228 leave applications forms were received and all captured on PERSAL. This development will go a long way in reducing audit findings and improve internal control mechanisms.

The department is striving to develop internal skill and enhanced expertise of employees through training. The mandatory skills levy has been used to train ten (10) employees in veterinary services with administrative capability course while three (3) employees in human resources have been trained and received a certificate in health and wellness. Furthermore, thirteen (13) employees were awarded bursaries for the different courses relating to agriculture and development in their current fields. As a way of contributing to eradicating poverty in our community, sixty (60) unemployed deserving youths were awarded bursaries as means to help them participate meaningfully in the mainstream of the economy.

The department hosted a successful MinTEC. It is an agricultural specific committee that deals with among others benchmarking of agricultural positions so that there is uniform approach when appointing officials in the agricultural sector.

Security

To date one hundred and forty-seven (147) applications for vetting have been submitted to (SSA) State Security Agency. In this quarter only five (5) applications were submitted from the total of which four applications were processed but not finalised. The relationship with SSA has also improved to measure performance and also confirm existence of applications submitted in the first year.

Legal Services and Logistical Services

The records of all unsuccessful applications for positions in the Department for the periods 2013 to 2015 have been disposed. One (1) file was transferred into the departmental system.

White fleet

The total number of white fleet in the department is ninety-two (92). A total of thirty-eight (38) fleet was added to the fleet that must be replaced. This means that about 60 vehicles still require replacement. A file has been created for each vehicle from the white fleet. Each file contains the record of the user (driver), the year in which it was issued and or replaced and the frequency with which it is submitted for services and records of reported accidents.

Gender

The unit managed to host eight (8) information sessions in all five (5) districts. The unit had one (1) quarterly gender forum meeting and one (1) capacity development workshop. The Succession plan and Resettlement policies were analysed to ensure gender responsive.

Communications Services

About nine (9) media campaigns were done including on the following: Veterinary Services joining the world in celebrating "World Veterinary Day"; Women were advised to be consistent and determined in order to succeed in farming; entries for Female Entrepreneur Awards; Veterinary clinic in full swing for Sol Plaatjie Municipality; and MEC Shushu's Budget Vote Speech. The Department alerted farmers and land users on veld fires.

About fourteen weekly briefs were published on the following: Youth month, Youth day, Comprehensive Agricultural Support Programme, Africa day, Chronic Fatigue Syndrome, Respect Human Dignity and Equality, Moral Regeneration Movement, Freedom day, Registration of suppliers, Budget summary, Saam Werk Saam Trek and Policy Statement 2017/2018.

Telephone management system

The User Requirement Specification (URS) documents (VPN &Voice) has been signed. SITA will now compile and finalise a proposal that will be submitted to the Department for the HOD's signature, SITA will then schedule the Project Meeting to communicate on the plan.

Deployment of Windows 10 and Microsoft Office Professional Plus 2016

IT staff visited the under mentioned regions to deploy Windows 10 and Microsoft Office 2016. The visited regions resulted in more than 80% completion of the deployment: (ZF Mgcawu, John Taolo Gaetsewe, Frances Baard and Pixley Ka Seme) Namakwa will be completed during the second quarter. Global Computing have completed deploying Microsoft infrastructure on our cloud platform that the Department has through the Microsoft Enterprise Agreement. Three (3) trainings sessions were conducted on Windows 10 Microsoft Office 2016 and eighteen (18) incidents/problems were resolved within five (5) working days.

LandCare

A total allocated budget of R 7 094,000.00 will be spent on three (3) of the five (5) districts of the province; Frances Baard, John Taolo Gaetsewe and Pixley Ka Seme. The stated budget will benefit over 1000 smallholder farmers, create over 200 green jobs, rehabilitate over 5000 ha of degraded rangelands and capacitated over 100 people.

No projects could start in first quarter.

Strategies to overcome areas of underperformance.

Towards the end of the first quarter Frances Baard Bush control project kick started its activities by demarcating the first site to be rehabilitated. The aim of this project is rehabilitated 1000ha of rangeland by controlling bush encroachment caused *Acacia/ Vachelia Mellifera* at Fairfield, Witfontein (Both Dikgatlong local municipality) and Majeng (Magareng local municipality). The project will benefit 80 farmers and will employ 20 people (11 Women and 9 Men). Project will start early in Quarter 2.

Narrative progress

3.1.1 Number of small holder producers receiving support.

In total of 149 farmers received support of infrastructure development and supply of production inputs through CASP and Illima/ Lestema Funds as well as drought relief interventions.

The support also included the supply and delivery of vineyard and lucerne production inputs including fertilizer, herbicides and pesticides and protective clothing to Lemoendraai and Eksteenskuil Vineyard projects in ZF Mgqawu District. A vineyard tractor was procured for Onseepkans Irrigation Development in Namakwa District. At Rooibos Emerging Farmers Development Project, 50 smallholder farmers (15 female, 35 male and 5 Youth) were supported with 117kg conventional Rooibos seed to ensure sustainability of the business. About 8 Farmers in Sikhulule poultry project received 1000 day old chicks and 4 farmers at Emthanjeni hydroponics received a cash advance for payment of labour at the Pixley Ka Seme District.

At John Taole Gaetsewe District there was a delivery and installation of 3 gates for grazing camps at Maalogane Commonage farm for 13 farmers.

Installation of water pipes and tanks as well as solar panels was done at Waterfall, Groenville, and Rust & Vrede at Commonage Farms in Frances Baard District for proper grazing management and increased production in the District

The Department assisted the following Local Municipalities; Gamagara, Gasegonyana, Joe Morolong, Siyancuma, Hantam, Tsantsabane and Kgatelopele, with advice regarding the review of their commonage policies, how to deal with illegal occupation of camps on commonages and how to address the inadequate or shortage of land to expand the current commonage land, issues of Conservation of natural resources especially land, application for farms through the Department of Land Reform & Rural Development and how to improve cooperation between farmers and Municipalities on commonage land. Additional issues discussed were the poor condition of infrastructure on communal land, problems with predators and bush control measures to improve grazing potential of the commonages. Municipalities were also advised to renew lease agreements of farmers.

Support to land holding institutions

The following Restitution farms' CPAs were supported; Kono, Dikgweng, and Holpan. The main discussion was sourcing of funds through DALRRD and the Department of Rural Development and Land Reform for infrastructure development and other projects to generate income.

3.2.2 Number of participants trained in agricultural skills development programmes

Through CASP Funding farmers are trained to improve their farming skills to increase production and 334 farmers received training on the following: Beef Cattle Production, Animal Husbandry, Financial Record Keeping, Vegetable Production, Small Stock Management, Calculation of Best Linear unbiased prediction (BLUP), Connection and use of cattle scale, Livestock Management and Drought Feeding, Application of pesticides, Pruning of dates and Drought mitigation and Veldt Management. A concerted effort by officials in different Directorates took place where non credited training sessions was conducted by:

- Extension practitioners
- Economics unit
- A newly appointed manager at Namakwa Irrigation Development Project

In total, Males, Females and Youth attended training sessions at 4 different districts and had various sessions as follows: John Taole Gaetsewe 4, Pixley Ka Seme 1, and Namakwa 4 while Frances Baard received 4 sessions.

3.2.8 Number of work opportunities created through EPWP (CASP & Ilima/ Letsema)

During implementation of projects, 194 work opportunities were created through infrastructure development and this included; cleaning of vineyard orchards at the following vineyard development projects in Namakwa and ZF Mgcawu Districts: Henkries, Blocuso Trust, and Lemoendraai.

Through the Fetsa Tlala Food Production Projects, seasonal jobs were created for cleaning and irrigation of maize farms in Frances Baard District. This happens mostly on flood irrigated plots where farmers use plastic pipes to irrigate their farms. Seasonal jobs are created until harvesting period at the end of June.

More work opportunities were created at Hydroponic projects in John Taole Gaetsewe and Pixley Ka Seme Districts for cleaning and maintenance of hydroponics. Seasonal jobs were also created at Umsobomvu Commonage for bush clearing and digging of pipelines.

Youth Farmers Supported

Frances Baard held a successful and vibrant youth information day at one of the farms allocated to a young graduate by the Department of Rural Development and Land Reform. In total, 67 young farmers attended the event from the four local municipalities. A 120ha plot; VH 32, belongs to Mr Thapelo Tlhokwe. A Youth structure was elected to work closely with the Department to assist and develop young farmers.

Three young farmers from Phokwane Municipality in Frances Baard took initiative to attend NAMPO Agricultural show in Bothaville at their own costs. The feedback was to motivate others to also attend to learn about advanced agricultural technology.

Fetsa Tlala Food Production Programme

This initiative aims at putting 1million hectares of unproductive land into production, creation of jobs and to address challenges of food security in the Province. In Namakwa District, 170ha of grains for winter crop is planted comprised of 100ha wheat and 70ha of oats at the following Kamiesberg Municipal projects; Kharkams, Spoegrivier, Tweerivier and Leliefontein and 84ha of wheat at 4 projects (Kalkput, Fairfield and VH20). Wheat inputs and diesel were supplied and delivered at Drieplotte in Pixley Ka Seme District to plant winter crop production. In Frances Baard, 12 projects successfully harvested maize at total yield of 1 229tons with market price of R 1 700. 00/ton, a decrease of price due to oversupply of maize in the country.

In Pixley Ka Seme District, a female farm project produced 190tons of maize on 25ha (8tons/ha). This is equivalent to the amount of R 380 000 at R 2 000/ton and were further supported with 25ha worth of wheat inputs, including fertilizers for the winter season. They partnered with a commercial farmer Jomalic boerdery for planting of 30ha lucerne on a 5 years contract



Narrative progress

African Swine Fever at Alfa Farm

At the time ASF outbreak in Pniel was thought to be under control, another outbreak was reported at Alfa farm which is 30km north of Pniel and 20km north of Barkly West. The farmer has been farming with pigs since 2004. This is a closed herd with no introduction of any pigs. The first carcass was found on the 25th of May 2017. The pigs started to die in large numbers from the 26th May 2017.

All the 44 pigs on the farm have died and the source of infection is suspected to be;

- Swill fed to pigs that was obtained from the funerals in Barkly West.
- Lucerne that was fed to pigs and was obtained from Pniel where we had the first outbreak.
- The intestines of the warthog that was fed to pigs in Mid-May 2017.

The property has been put under quarantine. Surveillance of the warthog population will be conducted in the next week to determine if the virus is in the warthog population or not. Trace back of the swill is currently underway as well as the origin of the Lucerne. Typing of the virus is still underway to determine if there is any link with the Pniel outbreak. What is worrisome is that the meat and bone marrow sampled from the pigs sold in Barkly West tested positive for ASF. The meat is from Alfa farm. We have also established that pig farming in Barkly West is on the rise. Our officials will be visiting the affected areas to raise awareness about the disease and the control measures that have to be applied to prevent further spread of the disease.

African swine fever is a highly contagious disease of pigs that may result in high mortality, fever, hyperaemia of the skin and a variety of other clinical signs, including incoordination, diarrhoea and pneumonia. It is clinically indistinguishable from classical swine fever (CSF), and similar lesions are seen at postmortem examination. Movement of infected pigs and pig products is the most important means of spread. ASF is not a zoonosis i.e. does not affect humans. There is no vaccine or treatment available.

Avian Influenza Outbreak

The Zimbabwean Veterinary Services recently reported an outbreak of Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza (HPAI) in chickens in Zimbabwe which affected one of their commercial farms. The H5N8 Avian Influenza virus has been diagnosed in Zimbabwe and is highly pathogenic, which means that it can kill birds and it spread fast.

Following the outbreak in Zimbabwe, two (2) separate outbreaks of HPAI (H5N8) has been confirmed in Mpumalanga. The affected farms have been quarantined and culling of the affected animals has been completed. The Department of Agriculture, Forestry and Fisheries is conducting both forward and backward tracing to monitor the movement of all the poultry in and out of the farm to establish the source of the influenza.

The Department of Agriculture, Forestry and Fisheries has established a 30km control zone in Mpumalanga and the Free State. The provinces are conducting surveillance in the control zone for other affected properties. All provinces have been notified and are on high alert. The government introduced a countrywide ban on the sale of live poultry to try to contain the outbreak of the highly contagious bird flu.

H5N8 is a rapidly spreading viral disease that can infect many types of birds and it is highly contagious.

An emergency meeting of provincial directors has been called by the National Director: Animal Health to discuss matters related to the current outbreak of HPAI in South Africa Poultry owners in the province are advised to observe the following measures;

- Housing their chickens and making sure that they do not come into contact with wild birds.
- For backyard and free roaming chickens, place their feed and water in the house and keep the chickens away from any open water sources where they might have contact with wild birds.
- Access of all people and vehicles onto the chicken farm is controlled.
- Proper disinfection procedures are in place at the entrance to the farm
- Report mortalities in chickens to the nearest state veterinary office.
- To note that vaccination against Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza is prohibited in the country.

Unyathi Court Case

The department was taken to court by Unyathi Game Reserve Management. Unyathi Game Reserve had organized an auction for May 2017 and buffalo had to be tested before any movement. Four of the buffalo from the herd tested suspect and as a result the farm was placed under quarantined. A dispute arose regarding the interpretation of the skin test and this led to an urgent court order. An out of court settlement was reached which ordered that the National Director of Veterinary Services appoint 2 veterinarians from provinces other than the Northern Cape and the applicant similarly appoint two (2) private veterinarians to assess the disease status of the four suspects animals. The team completed its report and the department is busy implementing the recommendations where applicable.

Springbok Nek

A post-mortem of buffalo bull from Springboknek revealed lesions suspicious of Mycobacterium Bovis. Samples have been sent for Mycobacterial culture and typing. 7 suspicious reactions were picked up on follow up test. The farm is under quarantine and regular testing with the help of the private wildlife veterinarian is continuing to ensure that the farm reverts back to negative status.

Congo Haemorrhagic Fever

A farmer fell ill after slaughtering a Gemsbok for a church festival in the Joe Morolong District Municipality. Four days later, he started bleeding through his skin and excretions. He later died at the Kimberley hospital. An emergency District Outbreak Response Team meeting was convened after the National Institute for Communicable Diseases confirmed the diagnosis.

Botulism

2 big outbreaks involving baboons was reported in Calvinia. In the 1st outbreak, more than 50 baboons died two after a baboon was found dead in the feed store. The second outbreak involved 100 dead baboons over a two month period. Due to the build-up of dead carcasses and toxins, sheep also started dying as a result of botulism. The situation has normalized after intervention by our veterinary officials.

Export Control

All export approved abattoirs that were due were inspected and all but one were recommended for re-registration. The export approved abattoirs in the Province continue to operate at a high level.

Veterinary Public Health

The ongoing effort by VPH to curb and raise awareness on illegal slaughtering and food safety received much needed boost from Environmental Health in the Pixley ka Seme and

Frances Baard districts. The quarter saw the unit intensifying their food-safety campaigns with VPH in Pixley Ka Seme hosting a food safety workshop in collaboration with Environmental Health in the Pixley Ka Seme district municipality. The initiate will be an ongoing campaign which targets the formal and informal food premises from Butcheries, Restaurants and Food Take Away outlets with the first one held at Victoria West on the 16 March 2017 culminating in the second one being held in De Aar on the 10 April 2017.

The initiative saw a total of 15 Food Premises Managers and Owners attending an information session where the following issues were presented:

- Section 7 of the Meat Safety Act 40 of 2000.
- Regulation 962 Requirements for food premises
- Municipal Health Services By-laws.

Veterinary Public Health in the Frances Baard district was also invited to EH district meeting to share some light on our ongoing food safety campaigns in particular illegal slaughtering. The unit took this opportunity to sensitize our colleagues in the Municipal Health services to get on board in curbing and educating our communities regarding illegal slaughtering and sale of meat. The unit also made a plea to Management of Environmental Health to ensure decisive action against the non-compliant butcheries

The unit deems this interactions as crucial steps in ensuring that all relevant steak holders are on board in dealing with the scourge and intends to ensure that such interactions are forged throughout the province.

Progress on Key Deliverables

Combat illegal donkey slaughtering through active investigation and raising awareness of the dangers involved in consuming illegally produced meat:

- Illegal slaughtering is being combatted continuously through visits to food processing facilities, liaison with law enforcement agencies and food safety awareness campaigns.
- At a National level this is also done through close networking with DAFF and its law enforcement unit.

Establish De Aar as an export hub for ostrich and game meat as well as mutton and lamb:

- The registration of the abattoir is still suspended pending the appointment of a permanent state veterinarian.
- The process of appointing a permanent veterinarian has started and will be completed soon.

Implement, manage and monitor the Compulsory Community Vet Services programme to assist with the deployment of veterinarians in areas that are least serviced by the current pool of veterinarians:

- 6 CCS vets were deployed to the province by DAFF and they have already been involved various activities including spay campaigns.
- Seoding clinic is fully functional and provides clinical service to historically disadvantaged communities.
- Residents of Galeshewe are also making use of the CCS vets offices situated at the Veterinary laboratory.
- Prieska farming community who have been without a vet for years are also benefitting from this programme.

Export readiness of smallholder producers and implement the Animal Identification programme:

- The importing country issues an import permit stating the required conditions to be met before the animal and or animal product can be exported.
- Importing country requires freedom from diseases.
- The department procure vaccines for Brucellosis, Anthrax and Rabies and provide free annual vaccination to the smallholder communities.
- Regular inspections are also conducted and animals are tagged when they are vaccinated to make traceability possible.

Narrative progress

Research

Most of the animal production projects are long term projects and are progressing well. The new projects relating to the semen analysis are awaiting the delivery of the microscope and software and for staff to be trained in the use of the equipment. This should happen early in the second quarter.

The crop production trials which are long term, e.g. lucern are being evaluated regularly while the new trials will be planted in the second quarter.

The veld evaluation monitoring with the use of the drone is continuing at regular intervals.

Technology Transfer Services

Fruit fly

An economic impact study on the effect of fruit fly infestation along the Orange River in the Northern Cape Province has been conducted and is concluded. The study found that the effect of fruit fly infestation occurs on both a production and trade level. At the production level the impact is the cost of fruit-fly control as well as a decrease in crop value due to a loss of yield and quality while at the trade level it impacts as the loss of market access.

In addition the study found that the major crops that will be impacted by a fruit-fly infestation are table grapes and citrus. Due to the enormous economic multipliers of irrigation agriculture in the region the potential impact of a fruit-fly infestation could be devastating for the regional economy. The total estimated value of table grape and citrus production in the study region is R1.63 billion and the analysis in this study clearly showed that the major impact of a potential fruit-fly infestation will be the potential loss in market access to high value markets (up to R230 million per annum).

The knock-on effect (multipliers) of these scenarios were calculated and the results indicate that in total, job losses due to a reduction in the agricultural output/production (gross value) within the agricultural sector, in this region, can be in the order of between 1 182 and 5 911 depending on the magnitude of the loss in export value. The total turnover/production (i.e. quantity produced multiplied by the corresponding price - value) generated by the table grape and citrus industry in the region can potentially be reduced by between R134 million and R672 million. The contribution to total value added (Gross domestic product) can potentially be reduced by between R71 million and R353 million depending on the scenario. In addition, the only way to effectively control fruit fly infestation is through the implementation of an area-wide integrated pest management approach (AW-IPM). A rough estimation is that an AW-IPM program for the study region will cost in the region of R26 million per annum. Compared to what the potential impact may be, this is a relative small cost.

The study on the spatial and temporal occurrence of fruit flies among a section of the Orange River clearly confirmed the hypothesis that population hot-spots exists in the study area. It has been found that neglected fruit orchards, informal home gardens and table grape vineyards after the harvest has been concluded act as population hot-spots. It has also shown that the population moves with availability of food sources, i.e. the fruit fly population will move towards more favourable hosts — ripening wine/dry grapes. Seasonal variability in population numbers has also been shown.

Fall Army Worm

The presence of fall army worm (FAW) has been confirmed in the Northern Cape. First reports came from the Vaalharts Irrigation Scheme and one other case was reported in the Upington area. Control measures have been applied and the pest was controlled. The Department is represented on the FAW Emergency Response Steering Committee and all meetings are attended via teleconference. Necessary information is then disseminated to the relevant parties. The Department is also in contact with the Monitoring Services of the Department of agriculture, forestry and fisheries (DAFF) and is immediately informed of new occurrences.

Northern Cape Agricultural Information System

The scope of the Northern Cape Agricultural Information System (NCAIS) is to build a Departmental geographic information system for mapping purposes and to develop a database containing base-line information on projects to map the Department's footprint in the province. Activities during this quarter focused on completing all outstanding attribute data for the 2016/17 financial year projects and finalizing the database. Special attention was given to the linking of projects to the correct land parcels for spatial mapping of the Department's project footprint.

Natural Resource Management

The determination of the effect of stocking densities on animal and vegetation performance in the Upper Karoo region of the Northern Cape is partly dependant on the composition of the plant species in the region. Due to the vastness of the region, the use of spectral technology and remote sensing to discriminate between species is being investigated. Spectral signatures of twelve species were collected and initial analysis of the data is promising.

Fodder Banks

Funding was received via conditional grants for the production of fodder crops for a fodder bank on 60ha at Rietrivier RS, 40 ha at Vaalharts RS and 20ha at Eiland RS. Specifications for mechanization inputs for Rietrivier and Eiland RS are completed and was presented to the Specs Committee on the 14th of June. Specifications for lucerne rakes were adjusted from 5 wheel to 12 wheels. Specifications for the Rietrivier center pivots were presented at the specs committee on the 15th of March and adjudication is awaited. The specifications for the Rietrivier store will be presented at July specification committee, while the tender for the Eiland store facility closed on the 25th of May. **The** site clearing tender for Vaalharts also closed on the 25th of May 2017. Specifications for centre pivots at Vaalharts RS are ready to be tabled to the specs committee in July.

Infrastructure Support Services

A challenge is being experienced with theft of cables to the pivots. This is an ongoing battle for the farm foremen who try their utmost to keep equipment and tractors in a working condition. Supply chain procedures are extremely cumbersome to have tractors serviced and repaired and the few staff members try to keep researchers and technicians happy.

A submission to make animals available via the livestock improvement programme, slaughter the old excess research animals and auction the animals not suitable for LIP has been submitted and approved. This will assist staff in trying to manage the challenges they experience.

Progress on the Key Deliverables

Development of an aquaculture and fisheries strategy for the NC:

The current Northern Cape Aquaculture Strategy was drafted in 2007 and with the current focus on Operation Phakisa: Unlocking the Oceans Economy through Aquaculture, it was decided that the strategy should be reviewed and expanded to include all inland and marine aquaculture and fisheries. The 1st draft of a Marine Aquaculture Development Plan and Activity Summary was completed and presented at the Mariculture Working Group and the Provincial Coastal Committee. Stakeholder inputs will be incorporated and these documents will form the basis of the marine section of the strategy. The outcomes of the Strategic Environmental Assessment for Aquaculture Development in South Africa (SEA) will provide strategic information regarding potential development in the NC.

Implementation of a computer assisted sperm analysis (CASA) technology:

The Tankwa goat project highlighted the importance of new technology in the conservation of farm animal genetic resources. This included the collection of biological material, collection/preservation of semen, embryos and oocytes, genetic and phenotypic parameters. The National Zoological Gardens (NZG) as a partner in the Tankwa project is providing some of these services, but with planned new research on other species/breeds it is important for the Department to obtain its own equipment and technology. The planned CASA technology projects will include the Tankwa, Saanen and Boer goats, Karakul sheep and different beef cattle breeds. Some of the expected outcomes will be scientific papers, doctorate and masters studies. The computer assisted sperm analysis technology equipment (microscope and software) is currently being procured via tender processes. These processes started in the 4th quarter of 2016/2017 when the successful bidders were determined during Tender Evaluations. Orders for successful bidders were issued in the first quarter 2017/18. Due to the nature of the specialized equipment the delivery of items can only take place 8-12 weeks from the date of order. Procurement should therefore be complete in the second quarter when delivery and training will be done.

Technology development and transfer in the field of sustainable crossbreeding with beef cattle in semi-arid areas of South Africa:

An article 'Factors affecting the pre-weaning performance of Nguni and Angus x Nguni calves in an arid environment of South Africa' was published in the Applied Animal Husbandry & Rural Development Journal. This research is the combined efforts of the Department and the ARC and was conducted at Vaalharts Research Station. The results indicated that crossbreeding can increase the weaning weight of calves of Nguni cows with an average of 32 kg. Cow efficiency was also improved with 22% and these results can be implemented in determining breeding strategies of producers. Further investigations are needed into the reasons for the large variation in weaning weights and the effect of epigenetics on phenotypic diversity (the molecular mechanisms of environmental control over genetic activity and gene expression).

Implement the pilot trout cage culture project at Vanderkloof in collaboration with our partners

The survey of Vanderkloof dam with DAFF scientists and the technical partner was conducted on 4 June 2017. The report generated by the survey will guide the final application to DWS for access to the dam and indicate the exact location of the cages. Once the final application has been submitted a meeting of all the role players to discuss logistics and roll out will be organised. This meeting will be in August 2017 and currently the intention is to have the infrastructure in the water in September and fish in the water by October.

State Land Administration

Lot 40 Rietrivier Settlement was allocated to 3 emerging farmers by DAFF and it was difficult for them to locate the borders of the land. The department engineering services unit assisted beneficiaries to plot the borders of the farm. This will no enable the farmers to obtain post settlement support from various state departments.

Maphiniki Bush Control Project: EPWP

This is the continuation from the 2016/17 financial year, the project started on the 05 June 2017 and anticipated to be completed by the 15 December 2017. The intended output of the project is to control the remaining 1000ha of black thorn. The project created 30 job opportunities. The department facilitated the establishment and registration of 5 cooperatives. Out of the five, 2 Cooperatives Ratanang and Tshepanang cooperatives were assisted to register on the Central Supplier Database (CSD) and obtain tax clearance certificates in order to facilitate the ease of doing business with government and to also apply for funding.

District Labour Tenants Forum

The Department in conjunction with DRDLR resolved to launch District Labour Tenants Forums that will be responsible for taking up issues relating to Tenure Rights of farm workers and farm dwellers. The first District Labour Tenants Forum was established in the JTG District. The remaining four districts will be established in the second quarter. Officials of the Department were trained by the Department of Rural Development and Land Reform on the objectives and functions of the Land Rights Management Facility as a means to capacitate the Department to respond rapidly when evictions arise.

Farmworkers Equity Schemes

The State bought equity in farming operations as a means of empowering farmworkers and changing the composition of the Agricultural sector in the province. The farmworkers equity scheme was subsequently mismanaged by the commercial partners of the farm workers. The Department established a farmworkers Equity Scheme Task Team to investigate the loss of shares by farm workers who participated in the scheme, possible fraudulent reacquisition of shares disguised as dividends, possible violation of the Company's Act and Trust Deed Property Act. The task team is a multi-sectoral committee that meets on a quarterly basis composed of the DALRRD, DRDLR, SAPS (Directorate of Priority Crimes), Northern Cape Master of the High Court, Lawyers for Human Rights, Representatives of Beneficiaries, Phil4 (the company that did the investigation), AFASA, NAFU, The Human Rights Commission and the Legal Aid Board. An action Plan was developed to guide our work. The first quarter task team meeting was held on the 30th of June 2017 in Kimberley.

Figure 2: Statistical overview of outcome 7 performance




Figure 3: Represents indicators of outcome 7 as per the POA

2. DISCUSSION

<u>Sub-Outcome 1: Improved land administration and spatial planning for integrated development in rural areas</u>

For the quarter at hand 26 Municipalities have been supported with the Implementation of SPLUMA. Four Rural Development plan guidelines were completed in Frances Baard, ZFMgcawu, Pixley Ka Seme and Namakwa.

For the purposes of coordination the outcome 7 Programme of Action was developed and approved and circulated to all delivery partners. A provincial technical implementation Forum was held on the 19th of July 2017

Sub-Outcome 2: Sustainable Land Reform contributing to agrarian transformation

Inequality, poverty and unemployment remain endemic in the historically disadvantaged communities. This is an indication that agrarian reform has not yet translated into the desired strategic objective of equitable ownership, establishing sufficient numbers of new black commercial farmers, as well as ensuring productive utilisation of newly allocated land. DRDLR seeks to accelerate interventions in the implementation of all progress for the land reform as indicated below

A total of 1761.1528 ha of land were acquired in Pixley Ka Seme. A total of 15 Land claims were finalised in all district Municipalities and one claim was settled

Sub-Outcome 3: Improved Food Security

Food security is also threatened by the under-utilisation of productive agricultural resources in communal lands and land reform projects. The National Development Plan makes reference to a number of interventions to be implemented to improve food security. DALRRD together with key contributing departments (DSD, DOE, DOH and DRDLR) implemented the following for the quarter:

- 136 Households benefitted from Agricultural food security initiatives.
- 100 Households gardens were established
- 203 794 quantile1-3 learners with access to the National Schools Nutrition Programme
- 24086 people accessing food through DSD feeding programme (centre based)
- 1182 vulnerable households accessing food through DSD food security programmes
- 149 061 grants in payment including grant in Aid were processed
- 8217 social relief of distress application were awarded

<u>Sub-Outcome 4: Smallholder producers' development and support (Technical, financial, infrastructure) for agrarian transformation</u>

Farmer support

In total 149 smallholder farmers were supported through infrastructure development and supply of production inputs through CASP and Illima/ Lestema Funds as well as drought relief interventions.

The support includes the following:

Supply and delivery of vineyard and lucerne production inputs including fertilizer, herbicides and pesticides and protective clothing to Lemoendraai and Eksteenskuil Vineyard projects in ZF Mgqawu District. A vineyard tractor was procured for Onseepkans Irrigation Development in Namakwa District. At Rooibos Emerging Farmers Development Project, 50 smallholder farmers (15 female, 35 male and 5 Youth) were supported with 117kg Conventional Rooibos seed to ensure sustainability of the business. About 8 Farmers in Sikhulule poultry project received 1000 day old chicks and 4 farmers at Emthanjeni hydroponics received advance for payment of labour at the Pixley Ka Seme District. At John Taole Gaetsewe District there was a delivery and installation of 3 gates for grazing camps at Maalogane Commonage farm for 13 farmers.

Installation of stock water system was done at the following projects:

Installation of water pipes and tanks as well as solar panels at Waterfall, Groenville, and Rust & Vrede at Commonage Farms in Frances Baard District for proper grazing management and increased production in the District

For sustainable resource management;

In the Namakwa district -

Wine Development Projects -

- Coboob Contract for the supply and delivery of portable pump units and delivery pipes was completed.
- Onseepkans –The design for installation of irrigation and trellising systems for 17.6 ha vineyards completed. Tender awarding in process.
- Specifications and tender compiled and vineyard tractor procured and delivered.

Pixley Ka Seme district -

Intswenekazi Vegetable Garden -

Survey and design a shade net structure, tanks, drip irrigation system, security fence and solar pump system to establish a 1 ha food security garden.

Frances Baard district -

Stock handling facilities – Designs were completed and tender awarding in process to construct facilities on the following farms:

Stock Water Supply

Veterinary support,

The department supports smallholder producers through veterinary services. For the quarter total of 9893 tests were performed the equal of which meets the ISO 17025 standard and OIE requirements. A total of 80 clients were serviced for animal and animal products export control. A total of 888 epidemiological units were visited for veterinary interventions. Regular visits of abattoirs by VP officials ensure that abattoirs are operating at higher level of compliance, for this quarter 80.7% of level abattoir compliance to meet safety legislation was achieved.

<u>Sub-Outcome 5: Increased access to quality infrastructure and functional services, particularly in education, healthcare and public transport in rural areas.</u>

Access to education, health services, ICT, roads and transport continue to lag behind in rural areas when compared to urban areas. Well-functioning and supported communities will enable people to develop the capabilities to seek economic opportunities. In contributing in the development of rural communities the following was achieved for the quarter.

Eradicate infrastructure backlog in Rural Health facility to meet national core standards:

A total of 4 additional clinic, community health centres constructed and office facilities constructed.

Provide access to piped water in rural areas (house, yard and 200m from house)

- 8.73 water use authorisation applications were finalised as per the water use authorisation guidelines
- 111 tanks were installed for food production and other household productive uses.

Improved transport infrastructure and public transport in rural areas, with priority given to the 27 districts

• 24659 learners were subsidised with transport for the quarter under review.

Three cooperatives in the Frances Baard district were assessed through an agribusiness appraisal tool. The Department of Agriculture, Land Reform & Rural Development worked jointly with Department of Agriculture, Forestry & Fisheries. The assessment was conducted to monitor the management and production of each cooperative. The cooperatives received their assessment reports which outlined their challenges, strengths and weaknesses as well as areas needed improvement.


